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Funding Status for E-Rate and ECF

E-Rate for FY 2022:

The FY 2022 Form 471 Application Window closed on Tuesday, March 22, 2022. We expect FY 2022 funding waves to commence in mid-to-late April.

A special extended application window for new Tribal libraries closes May 26th (see [DA 22-231](#) and [our newsletter of March 14th](#)).

E-Rate for FY 2021:

Wave 52 for FY 2021 was released on Thursday, April 7th, for \$6.31 million, none for North Carolina. Cumulative commitments are now \$2.64 billion including \$84.3 million for North Carolina. Nationwide, USAC has funded 98.7% of the FY 2021 applications representing 95.1% of the requested funding.


ECF 2021-2023:

As of Wave 12, released March 23rd, cumulative ECF commitments are \$4.76 billion including \$150 million for North Carolina. Nationwide, USAC has funded 92.5% of filed applications. Authorized disbursements as of last Friday totaled \$669 million.

The FCC has announced a third ECF application window ([DA 22-309](#)) which will open on April 28th and close on May 13th. The FCC indicates that a minimum of \$1 billion will be available to fund the same type of eligible equipment and services as in the original two windows but for delivery within the 18-month span from July 1, 2022, through December 31, 2023 (albeit capped at 12-months of service for internet access). - April 15 FCC reply comments due on the Further Notice of Proposed Rulemaking for the Affordable Connectivity Program (“ACP”) ([FCC 22-2](#)).

- April 28 Opening of the third ECF application window (see [DA 22-309](#) and article above). The window will close May 13th at 11:59 p.m. EDT.
- May 26 Extended FY 2022 application window deadline for new Tribal libraries (see [DA 22-231](#)).

USAC ECF Newsletter Dated April 5

[USAC’s Emergency Connectivity Fund Program Newsletter of April 5, 2022](#), as frequently happens, simply repeats reminders and FAQs from last week’s newsletter.

Update on DUNS-to-UEI Transition:

This topic, covered in last week’s [USAC ECF newsletter of March 29th](#), was addressed separately this week in a short USAC release entitled “[SAM.gov Transition to UEI](#)” on April 7th and in a more detailed FCC Public Notice ([DA 22-371](#)) released on April 6th.

ECF applicants and service providers that are already registered in SAM.gov, which is needed to file ECF invoices, are not affected by this transition. Current SAM.gov registrations, already including a DUNS number, have already been assigned an UEI number. Unregistered entities will be assigned UEI numbers when they do register with SAM.gov.

For E-rate applicants not participating in ECF, the key point in both releases is that, although SAM.gov registration is currently not required for E-rate invoicing, it will be required in the future.

The FCC indicates that it is working with USAC to complete a full transition to the collection of UEIs and the use of SAM.gov for the collection of payment information from Universal Service Fund recipients including E-rate applicants and service providers.

Although the timing of a SAM.gov registration requirement for E-rate invoicing is unspecified, it may not be too far away. USAC is already recommending initiating the registration process in advance of an E-rate requirement. SAM.gov registration and periodic renewals are free for registrants handling the process themselves or can be done with the assistance of consultants specializing in federal registrations. In either case, the registration process is not instantaneous and can take several weeks.
